What's Special about Christmas?

All over the world, Christmas is regarded as a holiday of peace, joy, and hope. Christmas has come to represent peace and joy because of its association with the birth of Jesus Christ—one of the most important events to ever happen in the history of the world. Even our calendars are dated by the birth of Christ, as in B.C. ("before Christ") and A.D. (*anno domini*, or, "the year of our Lord"). When we cite the current year as 2017, we are saying it has been 2,017 years since the birth of Jesus. But why is the birth of Jesus Christ so significant?

Let's go back to the very beginning. God made Adam and Eve and placed them in the Garden of Eden. He gave man only one rule: don't eat THIS particular fruit!
